I want to thank Ms. Jasso for coming from San Antonio to speak with us about many of the amazing things that women in Texas have accomplished. After leaving the meeting, I was so excited about the opportunities BPW has to help more women in our community.

One of the ways that we have discussed helping more women is increasing our endowment at Midland College, so that it is an ongoing source of income towards scholarships. At our March Business Meeting, it was voted on and passed that we donate \$20,000 towards our Midland College Scholarship Endowment. Scholarship recipients in the past have had families and found it necessary to hold jobs outside of their school environment. As this endowment continues to grow, these scholarships will help relieve a portion of the burden so these women may graduate more quickly and with less debt. HISTORY OF THE COLLECT

Mary Stewart wrote the collect in 1904 as a member of the Fortnightly clubs, the forerunner of the Longmont, Colorado BPW Club. The collect was written as a prayer to instill a sense of unity among women working together with wide interests and important goals.

Mary Stewart worked for women's suffrage nationally and attended the meeting in St. Louis in 1919 at which the national federation was launched. She was elected its first corresponding secretary and thereafter took an active part in the growth of the young organization by service as chairman or member of a number of national committees.

The collect was reprinted in many forms around the world. Miss Stewart, who until 1910 signed the collect with her pen name. "Mary Stuart" remained involved in BPW until her death in 1943.



Equal Pay Day was originated by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996 as a public awareness event to illustrate the gap between men's and women's wages.

Since Census statistics showing the latest wage figures will not be available until late August or September, NCPE leadership decided years ago to select a Tuesday in April as Equal Pay Day. (Tuesday was selected to represent how far into the next work week women must work to earn what men earned the previous week.) The date also is selected to avoid religious holidays and other significant events.

Women in History

- 4/2 Soia Mentschikoff 1915-1984
Attorney, one of the first women partners in a large Wall Street law firm (1945), worked on Uniform Commercial Code (1941) University of Chicago Law School professor (1952), candidate for Supreme Court
- 4/9 Mary Winston-Jackson 1921-2005
one of a small group of African-American women who worked as aero nautical engineers, called "human computers," at NASA during the Space Age. The story of her life at NASA is depicted in the 2016 film *Hidden Figures*
- 4/9 Florence B Price 1887-1953
Award winning pianist and composer who became the first African-American woman to have her work performed by a major symphony, Songwriter
- 4/9 Ellen Tupper 1822-c-1888
Leading authority on culture of bees, 1866-1888
- 4/12 Justine Polier, daughter of rabbi Stephen Wise, first woman in New York Workmen's Compensation Division, Domestic Relations Court Judge (1935-73),
- 4/13 Lucy Craft Laney 1854-1933
School teacher and educator, opened school for African-American students in the South in the late 1800s. Also opened a training center so that black women could train as nurses
- 4/18 Ruth Bunzel 1898-1990
Anthropologist, with Ruth Benedict studied the art and culture of south west Indian women starting in 1924, learned Zuni language, pottery and sewing to understand and preserve the culture
- 4/21 Elizabeth II 1926-
Queen of England, longest reigning monarch in British history. She celebrated 65 years on the throne in February 2017 with her Sapphire Jubilee (became queen 2/6/1952). She has tried to make her reign more modern and sensitive, while maintaining traditions associated with the crown.

The First to Have a Building Named for Her

The First Sergeant Major of the WAC Training Battalion (1954-64) Sgt. Maj. Florence G. Munson was honored by having the headquarters and classroom building for the WAC Training Battalion dedicated in her honor in October 1965. She was the only WAC to have a building named for her at the Ft McClellan WAC Center.

The first military all women band was the Women's Army Band organized at Fort Des Moines in 1942. It was led by then sergeant - **MaryBelle Nissly** - the job called for a warrant officer but there was no legal precedent to appoint her to that rank. As a result of special legislation, early in 1944 WAC Sergeant Nissly became the first woman in military history to win a warrant officer band leader appointment. WO Nissly left the Army in 1946 but returned to the service as a Captain in the Air Force in 1951 to organize the USAF WAF Band. The 50 member concert unit performed all over the world playing everything from classics to rock and roll. Unique to the WAF band was the only woman coach horn soloist in the USA - **Tech Sgt Marty Awkerman**, a graduate of the Cincinnati Conservatory. Olive Hoskins was the very first woman promoted to Warrant Officer in the Army in 1926.

The first WAAC Training Center was established at Fort Des Moines, Iowa in 1942. The first WAAC OCS class was at Ft Des Moines from 20 July to 29 August 1942 .

One of the first WAAC/WAC First Sergeants at Des Moines in '42 was **MSgt Margaret A. Hardy** of South Amboy, New Jersey .
